


The use of the 3-D approach can be helpful when reflecting on stories of practice with colleagues or students (Graham, 2013).



- DISCOVER critical moments from practice in the story
- DEEPEN your understanding of the issues involved through asking open questions of the story-writer and linking with relevant literature
- DO set targets to make changes in practice to embed the new ideas and carry these through.

 create mutual openness and trust be attentive and listen show respect be patient and caring create a positive environment show empathy exhibit a sense of sharing 	 ask open questions don't make assumptions be non-judgemental offer feedback through summarising, paraphrasing and further questioning make links between theory and practice share insights and hunches 	 identify next stages to take the learning forward establish a vision for the future set targets critically reflect on insights gained and any new connections made identify patterns of behaviour promote and support change identify measures of success
